Communication

Engage in meaningful discussions in all areas of the curriculum.

Speak to small and larger audiences at frequent intervals.

Practise and rehearse sentences and stories, gaining feedback on the overall effect and the use of standard English.

Listen to and tell stories often so as to internalise the structure.

Count and calculate in a range of practical contexts.

Use and apply mathematics in everyday activities and across the curriculum.

Repeat key concepts in many different practical ways to secure retention.

Explore numbers and place value up to at least 100.

Add and subtract using mental and formal written methods in practical contexts.

Multiply and divide using mental and formal written methods in practical contexts.

Explore the properties of shapes.

Use language to describe position, direction and movement.

Use and apply in practical contexts a range of measures, including time.

Handle data in practical contexts.

Understand what algorithms are, how they are implemented as programs on digital devices, and that programs execute by following a sequence of instructions.

Design purposeful, functional, appealing products for themselves and other users based on design criteria.

Make

Select from and use a range of tools and equipment to perform practical tasks such as cutting, shaping, joining and finishing.

Select from and use a wide range of materials and components, including construction materials, textiles and ingredients, according to their characteristics.

Evaluate

Explore and evaluate a range of existing products.

Technical knowledge

History

The lives of significant individuals in Britain's past who have contributed to our nation's achievements - scientists such as Isaac Newton or Michael Faraday, reformers such as Elizabeth Fry or William Wilberforce, medical pioneers such as William Harvey or Florence Nightingale, or creative geniuses such as Isambard Kingdom Brunel or Christina Rossetti.

Key events in the past that are significant nationally and globally, particularly those that coincide with festivals or other events that are commemorated throughout the year.

Significant historical events, people and places in their own locality.

Music

Use their voices expressively by singing songs and speaking chants and rhymes.

Play tuned and untuned instruments musically.

Listen with concentration and understanding to a range of high-quality live and recorded music.

Make and combine sounds using the inter-related dimensions of music.

Personal Development

Discuss and learn techniques to improve in the eight areas of success.

Physical Education

Participate in team games, developing simple tactics for attacking and defending.

Perform dances using simple movement patterns.

Religious Education

Study the main stories of Christianity.

Study at least one other religion. Choose from Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism or Sikhism.

School Geography

Use aerial photographs and plan perspectives of Millbrook C P School and other local places of interest to the children.

Children to ask geographical questions, such as, What is a place like? What will I see/feel/hear in this place?

Use simple fieldwork and observational skills to study the geography of Millbrook C P School and its grounds and the key human and physical features of its surrounding environment.

School Mathematics

All classes will follow White Rose Mathematics Planning including the yearly overview for year groups and mixed age classes.

Count in multiples of 2,5 and 10. Recall and use doubles of all numbers to 10 and corresponding halves.

Recall and use multiplication and division facts for the 2, 5 and 10 multiplication tables, including recognising odd and even numbers. (Y2 only)
